The *Global Philanthropy Tracker (GPT)* is a first-of-its-kind research effort to measure cross-border donations from individuals and organizations around the world.

The *2023 GPT* bridges the gap between an increasing need for philanthropy and the lack of data insights into the scale and scope of cross-border giving.

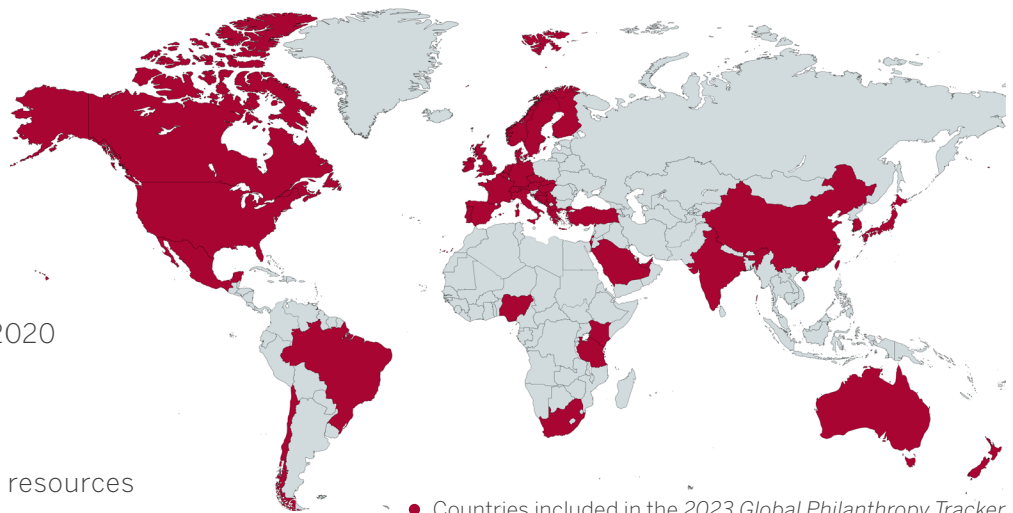

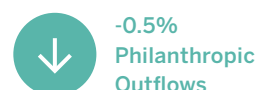
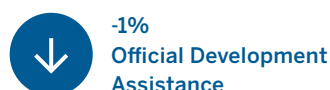
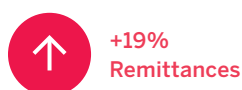

Compared with 2018, the total amount of the four cross-border resource flows from the 47 countries declined slightly by 2 percent in 2020.



¹ Total cross-border resource flows include philanthropic outflows, official development assistance (ODA), individual remittances, and private capital investment (PCI).

Top Charitable Causes

Education and health were the top charitable causes supported by cross-border giving based on available data about top causes from 14 countries.
