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A Case of Uterine Sarcoma: The Impact of Insurance Policy on Timely Access to Hysterectomy

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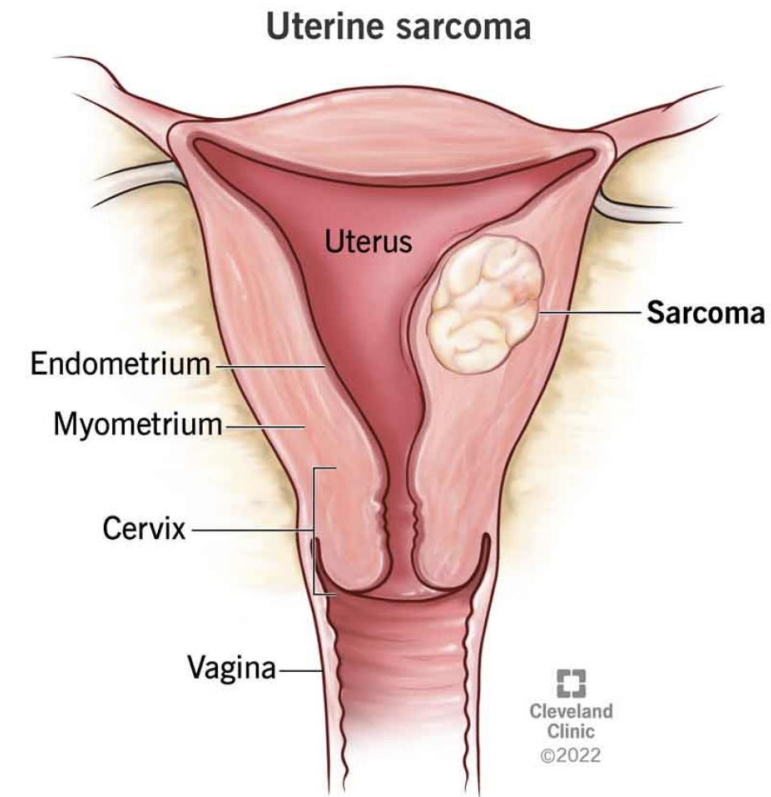
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Background

Uterine sarcoma, a rare and aggressive malignancy, is often diagnosed late due to non-specific symptoms.

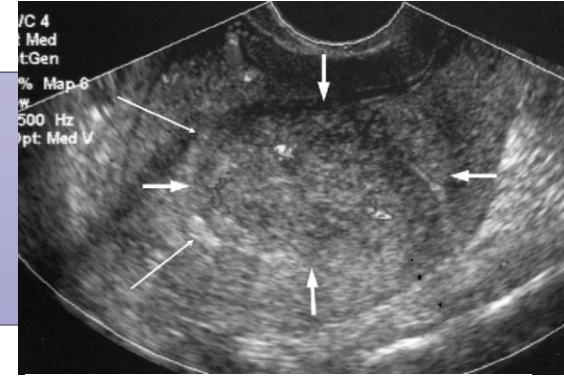

Case Presentation

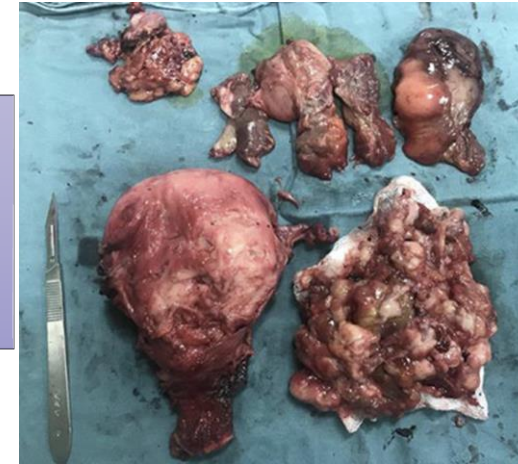
A 41 y/o/F with profuse uterine bleeding was initially diagnosed with uterine fibroids.
